Publication Ethics

The *NZOJIS* will work to provide a decision to authors on publication within a reasonable time period. The journal editors will ensure confidentiality of communication with authors, provide disclosure of any organisational involvement and sponsorship and ensure that any advertising or sponsorship has no influence on editorial decisions.

Authorship and Publication: It is the responsibilities of authors to confirm that there work is not submitted elsewhere, to acknowledge sources, that any studies conform to local, national and international laws, and approval is sought from human subjects where necessary; that authors of work submitted have contributed to it; that all data is authentic; and that retractions and corrections of mistakes have been provided. NZOJIS asks that published authors maintain high standards of reporting; that their work is original and free from plagiarism, that proper acknowledgement of sources is made, and that any conflicts of interest are disclosed.

Peer Review / Reviewer's Tasks: Our reviewers make an important contribution to the editorial decision. We ensure reviewer confidentiality, standards of objectivity, and disclosure of any conflicts of interest with research or research funders, and commitment to identifying published work which is not yet cited.

Editorial Responsibilities: The editors of NZOJIS reserve the right to accept or reject any article; where errors in texts are found, editors will correct or retract them; editors will maintain reviewer anonymity; and papers will only be accepted when certain decisions are made regarding their applicability; to accept or reject work based on academic merit; to follow reasonable procedures to investigate and resolve any complaints.

Treaty of Waitangi and Cultural Diversity: NZOJIS will promote cultural diversity in considering articles and comment for publication. Where work originates and pertains to New Zealand content, consideration of the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi will be made, in so far as no work will directly conflict with bi-cultural or multi-cultural ethos.
